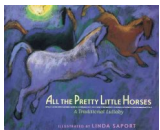

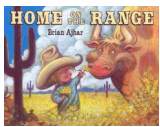


All the Pretty Little Horses : A Traditional Lullaby

A traditional lullaby presented with music, a note on the origin of the song, and pastel illustrations which reflect its possible connection to slaves in the American South.

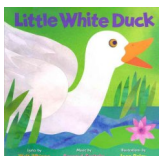


Home On The Range

In this illustrated version of the familiar song, a young boy is transported from his city apartment to life on the range.

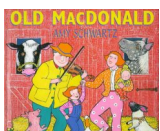


Little White Duck

Based on the song of the same title, a little white duck causes a commotion in its pond.

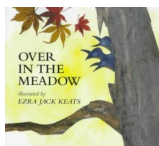


Old MacDonald

The inhabitants of Old MacDonald's farm are described, verse by verse, including his tractor and his neighbors. Music is given on last page.

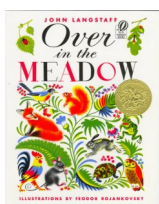


Over in the Meadow

Verses describing the activities of various animals also illustrate the numbers one through ten.

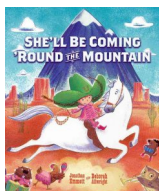


Over in the Meadow

A girl trying to get a little bug off her knee enlists the aid of a series of increasingly larger animals.

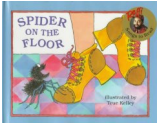
Soldier, Soldier, Won't You Marry Me?

By providing the soldier with a fine suit of clothes, a young maid tries to entice him to marry her.

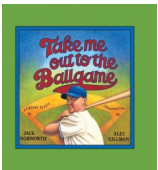


Spider on the Floor

(Juvenile Nonfiction - J 782.42164 Ru)

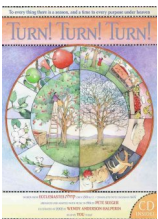
Presents the illustrated text to the song about the curious spider. Includes musical notation.

The lyrics of the familiar song, illustrated by pictures based on the World Series games played between the Dodgers and the Yankees in 1949 in Ebbets Field.

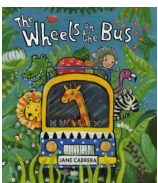


Turn! Turn! Turn!
